### Calculation Methods\*

Numerator divided by the denominator times 100

### Numerator including inclusion/exclusion\*

Weighted number of respondents who answered “Extremely” or “very” stressful to the following question: How stressful is your job as a general practitioner/primary care physician?

Response options: 1. Extremely/very stressful, 2. Somewhat stressful, 3. Not too/not at all stressful, 4. Multiple-response code, 5. Decline to answer.

### Denominator including inclusion/exclusion\*

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Percentage of primary care doctors who reported that their job as a primary care doctor was “extremely” or “very” stressful

Weighted number of respondents to the survey question above who answered “extremely/very stressful”, “somewhat stressful,” or “not too/not at all stressful”

Exclusions:

1. Those who answered “multiple-response code” and “decline to answer”.

### Adjustment (risk, age/sex standardization)- detailed

The primary care physician (PCP) data in Canada were weighted to account for: (1) the over-representation of PCPs in some provinces; (2) the availability of an email address or not (since respondents with email addresses could be contacted both by mail and email); and (3) differential nonresponse along known geographic and demographic parameters.
